Stewardship and Donations to Wimborne Minster



This year we have seen another sizeable increase in contactless and online donations (2025: £18504, 2024: £13269) as our visitors get used to using contactless devices. Quite remarkably we have had two donations over £1000 which we are unlikely to have received in cash or by cheque. Additionally, we have been able to use the system for sale of tickets for events and in particular the Flower Festival, where over £7000 was received by this method at the door. Last year I mentioned that if the congregation all managed to give the equivalent of an extra coffee per week (£2.50) our finances would be strengthened. I am pleased to say that many of you took up the challenge and we have seen a very steady increase in our finances. Thank you for stepping up to the challenge. It is never too late to take the challenge now. Interestingly I have read the budget report for Salisbury Diocese for 2026 and they have used my analogy, saying that if every parishioner in the Diocese gave £2.45 (the equivalent of a coffee) per week to the Diocese then they would break even and would

not have to reduce posts, and sell surplus clergy houses and investments. It is hard to believe that we could all make a huge difference with just a small amount. Let us pray that this comes to fruition.



PARISH GIVING SCHEME

Around this time of year, the Parish Giving Scheme, used by many who contribute to the Minster, asks donors to consider uplifting their giving by the rate of inflation; they will tell you what that amount is. It would be very nice if we all are able to do this. Perhaps those who still pay by standing order might also consider a similar uplift in their giving. We have a number of new schemes in the pipeline to benefit our wonderful building, the first of which is likely to be the new disabled access at the north door.

To summarise it is very heartening to see the increased giving to the Minster and I sincerely hope that this continues into next year and beyond. Armónico Consort, directed by Christopher Monks
Thursday 5 March 2026 at 7pm, in the Minster



Armonico Consort is a critically acclaimed choir, instrumental ensemble and music charity, set up in 2001. They combine passionate and inspiring performances of music (particularly Renaissance and Baroque) with providing imaginative singing opportunities for young people, and help for people living with dementia through the power of music. Their education programme (AC Academy) runs an in-school choir creation programme in this country, and has

also extended to outreach in Kenya and Mexico. Research suggests that Baroque music is extremely effective at unlocking memories for those affected by dementia: Armonico's Communities programme, with specialist training from the Alzheimer's society, now includes singing sessions in care homes. In March we welcome this highly regarded ensemble to the Minster. They will work with the Minster Choir and choirs from local schools, staged around the building and making the most of the Minster's acoustics. The programme ranges through the last 800 years of gorgeous choral music, linked by the chants composed by Abbess Hildegard of Bingen in the 12th century.

Tickets are available on Eventbrite from the beginning of January 2026.

This very special concert is a contribution by the Minster to Wimborne's Town of Culture 2026 programme.

Note: If you can't wait to hear the Armonico Consort, they sing regularly at Poole Lighthouse: you can hear them there on January 29th performing Handel's *Te Deum*, *Fireworks Music*, and *Coronation Anthems*.

Eco Tip: thinking about long distance travel



This is a tricky one to talk about when some of us are planning summer holidays - perhaps flying to other countries. This article may give us some guilty feelings when we really appreciate the effects on the environment of flights.

First, what is the effect of rising carbon dioxide (CO₂) on the environment? The US research agency NOAA sums it up as follows: 'In addition to warming temperatures, rising carbon dioxide levels can cause increased hurricane intensity, sea level rise, ocean acidification, and social inequities experienced by underserved and overburdened communities that face higher risks of illness and death from extreme heat' (<https://research.noaa.gov>).

Let's look at some figures:

- Aviation globally causes 2-3% of human-caused CO₂ emissions. Together with other gases and water vapour trails produced by aircraft, the industry is responsible for around 5% of global warming.
- In 2022 UK aviation (domestic and international) emitted 29.3 million tonnes of CO₂, accounting for roughly 7% of the UK's total

greenhouse gas emissions. This may not seem much, but it is set to increase as flights increase. In 2024 there was a 9% increase in UK based aviation.

What does that mean for individuals?

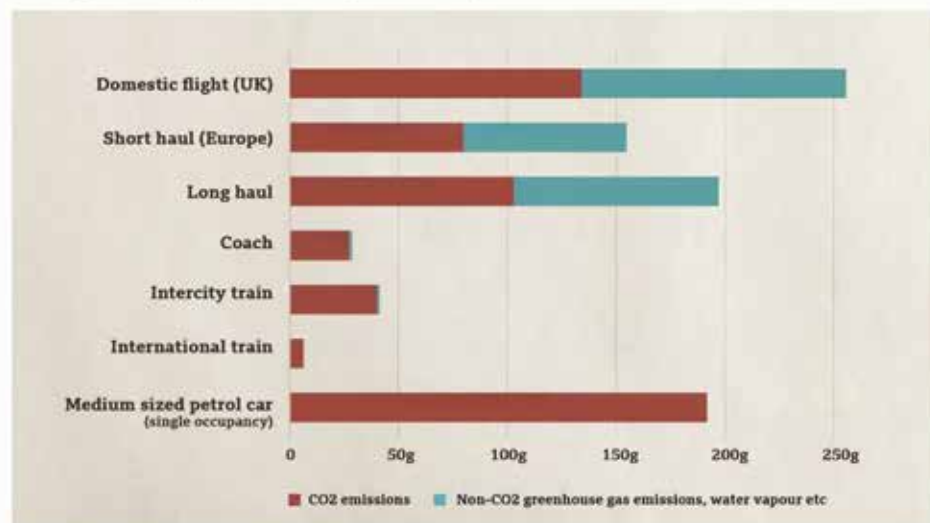
- A single passenger travelling on a domestic flight in Britain, for example, can lead to climate impacts equivalent to 254g of CO₂ for every kilometre they travel.
- A return flight from London to Berlin emits around 0.6 tonnes of CO₂ equivalent (CO₂e) - three times the emissions saved from a year of recycling.
- A return flight from London to San Francisco emits around 5.5 tonnes of CO₂e per person - more than twice the emissions produced by a family car in a year, and about half of the average carbon footprint of someone living in Britain.
- A long-haul flight can release the equivalent of 102g CO₂e for every kilometre - a lower figure on average per kilometre because of the huge amount of emissions given off during take-off and landing.

- Private jets used mainly for short distances with few passengers are hugely damaging for the environment.
- However, an intercity train releases the equivalent of just 26g for every passenger kilometre. Travelling by coach releases even less – the equivalent of just 18g of CO₂. They are the lowest carbon means of travelling but even driving a car is less carbon intensive than flying, provided you give someone a lift. (Driving alone in a medium sized petrol car produces about 192g of CO₂ per kilometre).

Are there ways of reducing emissions when you have to fly?

- Take as little luggage as possible.
- Travel economy class – business class passengers take up more space on the plane
- Very small or very large planes are less fuel efficient
- Avoid more than one flight if possible
- Consider buying carbon offsetting – but that's another topic!

So, should we give up flying for the sake of the planet?

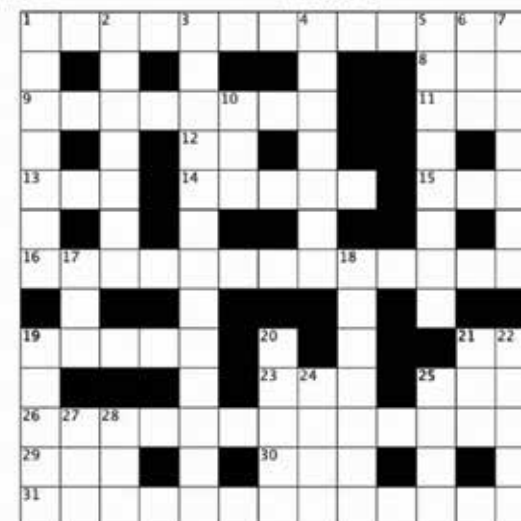
