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Seasons

Recently I read an article which carried out a survey looking at the fascination we Brits have with our weather.

The survey told us that we spend over four months of our lives talking about the weather! Breaking it down further the survey said that the average adult will post six weather-related comments a month on social media and also spend eleven minutes a week checking the weather forecast.

I am not too surprised at these results and often hear people talking about the somewhat problematic

climate in our country, bemoaning the fact that their event was rained off.

As we all know, despite our four distinct seasons, our weather can be very variable. Now we have reached our Summer season – June to

August – all of us will be hoping for plenty of warm sunshine in the longer daylight hours ahead.

The book of Genesis, in its first chapter, tells us that our creator God put the seasons into place so that we may have the right climate for life and food.

Our Church also has its seasons, known as the liturgical calendar, designed so that our worship has a structure to praise our God. The first

season is Advent, a time of preparation for our Lord's return, which is followed by Christmas. After which we have the season of Epiphany through which Jesus was revealed as the Son of God.

Lent is the next season, a time of self-examination, leading to Easter and the miracle of Jesus's resurrection from the dead, then on to Pentecost which marks the gift of the Holy Spirit to us.

Lastly, we have the longest season called Ordinary time. Far from being mundane, this season is like a time out from our busyness in which Christians explore the life and ministry of Jesus, also reflecting on our place in this world and what we can do for neighbour and environment in the seasons of our life journeys.

Our life seasons, as we know, can often be changeable, yet our God is a God of all seasons and his care and love is consistent and certain in our unpredictable world.

Count on Nature

The Minster Environment Group (MEG), God's Acre Team and Minster Families invite you to engage in some citizen science. We will be doing the 'Church's count on nature' on 6th June 10am till 12 noon in the Minster grounds. Children and parents can join the fun on the Forest garden and are also welcome in the God's acre plot and around the Minster. The aim is to identify and record as many species of plants, animals and insects that we can find in our Church yard. Recording species and sharing those records is a first step towards being able to protect them. The results are sent to 'Count on Nature' and are uploaded into iNaturalist: (<https://www.inaturalist.org/>).

Nature is changing faster than ever, so we need you to help record what lives where. The collated information allows national agencies to know what precious species are located where in the country. It helps the Church of England and the Church in Wales to know whether they are fulfilling their aims to care for and increase biodiversity and can be really useful if site managers are making an application for a grant.

All are very welcome. We will have magnifiers, pots, ID charts and books to help us. Please come and join the science.

Then, as we tidied the edges of the pond, placing stones on the liner edge, we were startled and delighted to find a whole cluster of frogs sheltering in a liner fold! 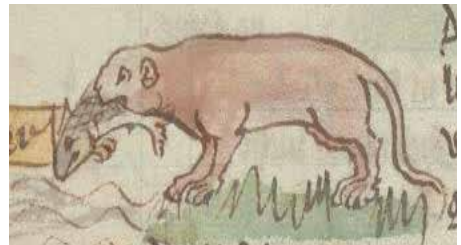

The Michael James Music Trust celebrates its 30th year of "Music Box" school lunchtime concerts at the end of the month. The Michael James Music Trust was established in 1981 by Raymond and Margaret James

(pictured left) in memory of their son, the young organist and conductor Michael James BA, FRCO. Its mission is to discover, promote, educate and support gifted young musicians. Michael James was Assistant Director of Music at Canford School and Assistant Organist at Wimborne Minster. About to take up an appointment as assistant at Rochester Cathedral, when he died of a brain tumour in 1981. This year we welcome young students from St Michael's CofE Middle School, Canford School, St John's CofE First School and Merley First School.

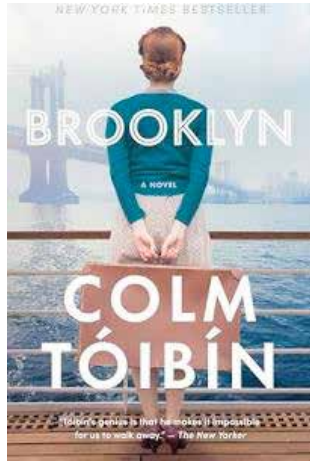

Book Review

Brooklyn, by Colm Toibin (2009, ISBN 978-0-144-04174-2)

Having read the two latest of Irish writer Colm Toibin's novels, *Long Island* (2023) and *A Long Winter* (2025), and thoroughly enjoyed them, I decided to read the novel that made his name, which was published in 2009 and won him (then an unknown) the Costa Prize that year. Opportunities for young girls in Ireland in the 1950s were scarce, so the older sister of Eilis, the heroine of the novel, who has no permanent work despite having considerable ability, arranges with a visiting priest, Father Flood from the USA, for his church to sponsor Eilis to emigrate to his parish in Brooklyn, New York. Eilis knows that if she is to make anything of her life she has to go, despite terror at leaving her mother, her family, her friends, her country, and not knowing if she will ever return. She endures a horrific crossing of the Atlantic by ship, which is graphically evoked with humorous undertones. She is found accommodation by the priest with a local landlady with half a dozen other young women, all in the same situation as herself. She is also found a job at Barlucci's, a local department store. She settles into her new life and, over time, receives promotion, acquires an Italian boyfriend Tony, and as time goes by, falls in love with him. She secretly



marries him before returning to Ireland for a visit, something she feels she must do since her beloved sister Rose has died. Upon her return to Ireland she is regarded as something of a celebrity in her local community, with her elegant clothes, and resumes her old life with friends and possessive mother. Right to the very end the story builds in

tension: will she go back to Brooklyn or not?

The book is beautifully written, so evocative of Ireland and Brooklyn in the 1950s, with characters so sympathetically portrayed and an excellent plotline; Toibin richly deserves the blurb's description, 'One of the country's most critically acclaimed successful novelists.'

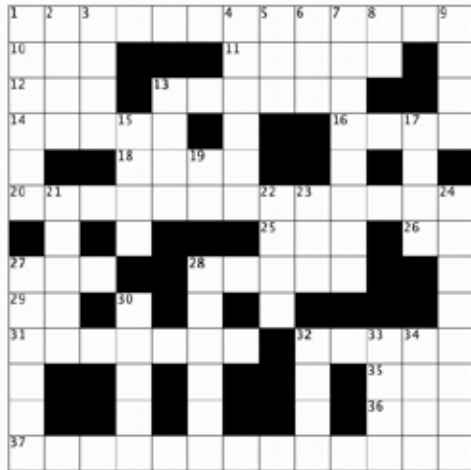
